What does it mean to be a woman? As a child I was such a tomboy. I roamed the valley and mountains in the small logging town in Oregon where I grew up. It was a time of cowboys and Indians, bicycles, swimming in the river, football, baseball, badminton, cars and trucks and piano lessons. We built a tree house and increased it to two stories with an escape hatch. Whatever the boys did, I did. Naturally, I wanted to be a boy. They seemed to have all the fun. I was the only girl in the neighborhood, so there were not many options. It was a great childhood with lots of action.

It wasn't until about the eighth grade that I finally gave up and realized that it was time to be a girl, since I was one. My younger brother recalls that it seemed like a switch was thrown and things changed.

In high school I wanted to take a mechanical drawing class, but was told that girls could not take it. Another girl and I complained that that was not fair. The principal agreed and we were able to take the class. This was my first semi-adult realization of discrimination of women, in this case, a young woman.

Perhaps you are wondering where is this leading? As women we have had to educate ourselves, find jobs, strive to combine work with raising families and also nurture ourselves. I was a teacher in Lake Oswego and thus in a field I loved and in one that had an equitable income schedule. Whether you were a man or a woman, your salary was determined by your education level and experience. The salary was equitable for men and women.

The role of women has changed and evolved in the last hundred years. In the process we are able to be aware of the world around us and how it relates to us and us to the world. Social and economic forces have affected all of us.

One of the major standard bearers for women has been the American Association of University Women. Our organization's role in forming public policy has been at the forefront of the growth for equal rights for women. In these times of divergent beliefs and political strife, we must continue to stand up for women's rights. Congress is not making much progress on women's issues. Women need economic security, college affordability, fair and equal pay and adequate health programs. We are in a time of national elections and voting choices are before us. Consider the voting record of your Congressman. AAUW Action Fund promotes voter education and strives to influence public policy. Read our newsletters for information. Would you like to be our new Public Policy Coordinator? You would then have the opportunity to inform yourself and others in our Lake Oswego Branch of AAUW. Please consider this important role.

## WHO'S WHO? Pat Squire, New Member



Pat Squire, in front of Simon Benson House Patricia (Pat) Squire is happy to be back in Oregon after several careers and moves across country. An "almost"-native Oregonian, Pat grew up in Eugene and graduated from the University of Oregon. Her father ran the University of Oregon Bookstore for 30 years and Pat spent a lot of pre-college years on campus.

After she earned her journalism degree at University of Oregon, she moved to San Francisco where she went into the advertising business. She worked for two agencies on accounts including; Bank of America, American President Lines, Clorox, Hunt Wesson Foods and others. She met her husband Fred, who was also in advertising, and he convinced her to move to Connecticut to go into the family's antiques business.

Pat and Fred lived in Greenwich, Connecticut where Fred grew up, and after a few years moved to the Berkshires in Massachusetts, where they started Squire Antiques. They dealt primarily in early American antiques and enjoyed doing shows, going to auctions and meeting other dealers. Pat also worked at a private secondary school doing publications, public relations and events. After eight hot and muggy summers and snowy winters, they decided the west was calling them back, and Pat got a job as alumni director at Portland State University.

During her tenure at PSU she was instrumental in moving the dilapidated Simon Benson House to campus and having it restored as the home of the Alumni Association. She also created programs in continuing education and advocacy support for the University. She earned her master's in Public Administration at PSU, was an active member of City Club, chaired her professional organization's regional board, and served as a board member and president of the YWCA board. She retired from PSU in August, 2011.

Donated items collected will be presented to Allison Hicks at the May event.



## New LO Branch Website Launched!

Last year AAUW National began offering branches the opportunity to host their site web server. There are several benefits to moving the branch site. First, there is no charge for hosting if our members maintain the site, saving our branch approximately \$120/year in hosting fees. Second, the site uses a program called Wordpress. This program does not require the person making updates to know anything about HTML programming. Third, the setup allows multiple members to update different parts of the site so that the burden of keeping the site current does not fall onto any one person. Finally, there is a secure member area where we can post the current version of the membership directory as it is updated from time to time throughout the year.

Our branch is the first Oregon branch to move to the national platform. Your Board believes this change will provide our members with more current information and access to a wider variety of information and resources. The site is still under development (for example, we need to add a header image that better reflects our group), but the calendar of events is current and other resources are available.
