Summer Experience Volunteering With Habitat for Humanity

Last August, 12 of us were sleeping on the floor of a school gym, eating tasty communal meals, and playing wild card games in the evening. During the day, we were helping to build a new house for Habitat for Humanity in Bend. Previously, we have built one story homes and even demolished a lovely 1920s home for recycled materials, but this was a more challenging two story home on a narrow, corner lot. The house was already framed and had the easy parts of the siding attached. On site, there was a dedicated team of local volunteers who worked 3 days every week on various projects, and a friendly, skilled woman who was the project manager supplied by Habitat. We painted, caulked, finished the tricky siding on the eaves, framed showers, put in door knobs, cleaned up the site, and wrestled for days with an uncooperative upstairs eave and dormer window. Both the men and the women chose their work assignments based on their talents, previous experiences, and their comfort level with power tools. Although our group varied widely in construction skills, we were all determined to help the owners and their children move into their new home before Christmas. They did!

Habitat for Humanity works to provide affordable and safe shelter to hardworking families through new builds and repairs on existing homes. Habitat sells their homes at or below cost, and will lend money to the partner families without interest. The family must be willing to contribute at least 400 hours of sweat equity, some of which may be accrued through classes in credit management and budgeting, home repair, estate planning, community life, identity theft and using a checking/saving account. The family must be able to afford a \$600 down payment, closing costs, and the monthly mortgage fees. They may not qualify for conventional financing or own other real estate, and must carry homeowners insurance. Each family is assigned a manager, to help them navigate the process of new home ownership.

If a rewarding, satisfying Habitat adventure suits your interests and talents, please contact one of the local chapters. No sane person would link me with power tools, but there are many other ways to be of service. We have truly enjoyed working on shared projects with some amazing people!
