I just came from a meeting of the fantastic Advocacy Group. These women, dedicated to our AAUW mission, are planning activities related to the Equal Pay Act and Title IX. The ten women at today's meeting (two new, and three others unable to attend) are intelligent, compassionate, and yes, passionate, about the issues facing women. Catharine Hojem, our host for the day, is working with Clackamas Community College (CCC) to discover where we can be of help to students. One way to assist is with mock job interviews with students and we will also provide Equal Pay information. Diana Ricks described the Start Smart/Work Smart program class she recently took, which is available on the AAUW national website free of charge at www.aauw.org. This program is something we can use at CCC and other locations to help young women learn how to get a job, negotiate for a good salary (equal pay!), and work smart.

One of the things we talked about was the power and talent of the women in the room. We have a banker, teachers, an IT expert, administrators, psychologists and counselors. How about a brief summary of our skills and interests so our partners (such as CCC) can see where our expertise can best be used? The branch is working on a database of members, including interests and experience. Look for details about how you can contribute your information!

Another discussion was the result of the recent Department of Education announcement posted on the AAUW Washington Update. The Department just issued a plan that would undermine the critical civil rights protections of Title IX. The new rules, which have significant implications for students' civil rights, are in the 60-day "public comment" phase, and you may expect a postcard campaign at our branch meeting on December 8. Our branch holiday campaign is in support of our scholarship at CCC. # Analysis: What the 2018 Midterm Results Mean for Women November 13, 2018

The midterm elections ushered in changes at all levels of government: Democrats took control of the U.S. House of Representatives, and Republicans will likely increase their ranks in the U.S. Senate. At the state level, Democrats flipped seven state legislative chambers and picked up at least seven of 26 previously Republican controlled gubernatorial seats.

But the dominant story of this election is the power of women. So far, polling suggests over 52 percent of voters in this election were female, matching their previous turnout record in the 2010 midterms. And not only did a record number of women run for office, a record number of those women will now serve, even as we await more election results. Beating the former high of 112 women set by the current Congress, at least 102 women will be sworn into the U.S. House of Representatives and at least 23 women will serve in the U.S. Senate. # Start Smart and Work Smart Diana Ricks

Start Smart and Work Smart are workshops AAUW National developed to help women successfully negotiate salary, promotions, and benefits, whether they are first time applicants, current workers, or returnees to the work force. While trained AAUW facilitators conduct the workshops, hosts include community organizations, educational institutions, and in some cases, municipalities and state governments who can offer workshops to an even wider audience.

During the two-hour workshop, attendees gain confidence in negotiation style through facilitated discussion and role-play as they navigate through the following components:

- Defining Gender Pay Gap and recognizing its impact, including long term consequences
- Identifying and articulating one's personal value as it relates to specific jobs and transferable skills
- Developing persuasive responses and negotiation strategies including how to get a raise or promotion and, importantly, when to walk away
- Conducting objective market research to establish a realistic target salary and benefits

Role-play is an especially important component of the workshops. With the goal of becoming a strong negotiator, participants try out their strategies, evaluate what works, and assess how to improve.

Workshops close with a review of the key lessons, sharing responses to two reflective

questions, and describing the next steps for the participants.

AAUW's research on the gender pay gap shows that, <u>one year out of college</u>, women already are paid significantly less than men. Women who work full time take home <u>80</u> <u>cents</u> for every dollar a full-time male worker is paid. It is well-known that "Women who negotiate increase their potential to earn higher salaries and better benefits packages. By negotiating fair and equitable salaries, you'll be better able to pay off loans, buy the things you want and need, and even save for retirement." <u>https://salary.aauw.org/work-smart/</u>

Women who attended these workshops should leave with the tools necessary to make the job interview work for them and result in an equitable salary and benefits package.

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In 2017, the state with the largest gap was Louisiana, which had a gender pay ratio of 69%; the state with the smallest gap was California, with a gender pay ratio of 89%. <u>https://www.aauw.org/research/the-simple-truthabout-the-gender-pay-gap/</u>


