
I invite each and every one of you to take an active role in the struggle for full equality and safety for women – under the law – in the workplace, at school and university, and at home.

As a dual member and Recording Secretary of the Gresham Branch of AAUW, Sharron is already an active participant in the Oregon State Public Policy Group and assisted in organizing Lobby Day this year.

Sharron has had an interesting and varied career. After completing her BA degree in sociology, she began as a caseworker for the State of Oregon in one of President Johnson's "Advocating for causes that "Great Society" Programs, focusing on assisting the poorer populations of Portland. She later became a Probation Officer for the City of Portland, a Juvenile Parole Officer in NE Portland, and an Investigator and Compliance Officer in the Civil Rights Division for the State of Oregon. From there she was recruited to be Assistant Corporate Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Manager at Georgia Pacific, and, later, Corporate EEO Manager at Evans Products.

In 1984 she returned to university, earning a Masters' Degree in Public Administration at Lewis and Clark University, and a Ph.D. in Workplace Adult Education and Design at Oregon State University. She decided to leave the corporate world and began a thirty-year career teaching at Portland State and Marylhurst Universities. She also taught and consulted for the League of Oregon Cities where she gave workshops on both Leadership in Turbulent Times and Supervision in the Public Sector to public sector managers from all over Oregon.
