Public Policy – Advocacy Committee

During this seemingly endless pandemic, the gender gap has become more obvious and devastating. Women are taking the brunt of lay-offs, home schooling and service-sector burn out.

The pandemic and resulting recession hit industries that employ more women than men — including restaurants, retail, hospitality and health care — harder than others, according to a working paper from the National Bureau of Economic Research. Plus, only 22% of women occupy jobs that allow them to work remotely, compared to 28% of men.

The high unemployment rate among women is also tied to the fact that the pandemic shut down schools and day care facilities. About 32% of K-12 students in the U.S. are currently attending schools that are only offering

virtual learning, according to the <u>latest</u> school opening report from Burbio, which tracks school and community calendars nationwide.

Fed Chair Jerome Powell says the most frightening aspects of the pandemic are women leaving the workforce and kids getting inadequate education. The Advocacy Committee plans to explore ways to support programs that address these kinds of issues.
