LOAAUW is pleased to host Gabe Sheoships, an enrolled citizen of the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, for an intriguing presentation centered on indigenous First Foods. He will speak as part of **Lake Oswego Reads**, adding his knowledge and experiences to complement this year's selected book, *The Seed Keeper*, which follows several generations of Dakhota families and their struggle to preserve their way of life.

For more than two decades, Gabe has worked to restore and protect First Food resources and, more broadly, to nurture the cultural heritage they represent. Currently Executive Director of Friends of Tryon Creek, he is a dedicated advocate for healthy ecosystems and for educating and empowering people to act as stewards of the land and water. His presentation will include a look at indigenous land management practices and their role in addressing today's environmental challenges.
