Scholarship and Education Committee

The Scholarship/Education committee is pleased to announce that they have entered into an agreement with Portland Community College to provide an annual scholarship named the Lake Oswego AAUW Scholarship. The Board approved this agreement at the April 4th meeting.

The committee also decided that the scholarship should go to an individual who is pursuing a degree in Early Childhood Education. The committee researched and discussed many options but decided on Early Childhood Education for three reasons.

- First, there is a dearth of qualified persons in this field throughout the United States. If women are to return to work after childbirth, they need to know that their children will be spending time in an environment that promotes learning.
- Second, the average starting wage for Early Childhood Educators in Clackamas County is \$39,340. The average monthly payment for \$20,000 in student loans (10 years at 5%) is \$212. The financial burden may lead some students to decide on another field.
- Third, while we cannot stipulate that the scholarship go to a female student, we have chosen a field in which the preponderance of students identify as female.

The initial scholarship will be for \$5,000 and will be awarded for the 2023-24 academic year. Due to three very generous donations we can meet this amount. In future years the scholarship must be a minimum of \$1,000. We can alter the criteria for the scholarship on an annual basis. We hope the membership is as excited as we are to begin this scholarship. Hopefully, we can continue this relationship with PCC for many years to come.

Thank you, Scholarship Committee, Sharon Brabenac, Catharine Hojem, Jeanne Lemieux, and Diana Ricks for their diligent work.
