She began her public service career as a public librarian. Starting in 2015, she worked for the next five years as an Elections Administrator in Multnomah County. Then she ran for her first elected position.

Catherine's objective is that everyone has equitable and fair access to the ballot and that elections in Clackamas County are error-free, secure, and transparent.

In her first year in office, she supervised three local elections and attended 18 local events in different ethnic Clackamas communities. In the past six months, she has administered at 54 weddings.

Catherine is committed to making inclusivity a top priority in her official position and her life. She will tell us how we can help in retaining trust in the election process and ways to get more involved in this important election year.

LANGUAGES OF LOVE

February is considered the month of LOVE. In the English language, there is only one phrase for saying "I love you" and is used in a myriad of different ways. Different languages and cultures vary in their approach to the word for instance in the Spanish language, the word/spelling literally changes depending on its usage. Te quiero is used among family members and friends. Te amo encompasses romantic love.

Dr. Gary Chapman, author of The 5 Love Languages: The Secret to Love That Lasts, explained that people have five different ways that they prefer to give and receive love.

- Words of Affirmation: This is about expressing affection through spoken word, giving praise, or communicating appreciation.
- Receiving Gifts: For some, love is best expressed through gifts, whether big or small.
- ♥ Quality Time: This love language is about giving the other person undivided attention.
- ▶ Physical Touch: To this person, nothing speaks more deeply than appropriate physical touch, whether a hug, a kiss, or a pat on the back.
- Acts of Service: Acts of service are anything you do for another that they would like for you to do. It requires thought, planning, time, effort, and energy.

The idea of "Acts of Service" can lead to a slightly different wording, which is "showing one's gratitude to another". The theory of Positive Psychology finds that gratitude can help relationships thrive by promoting a cycle of generosity. That is, one's own gratitude can prompt another to think and act in ways that convey gratitude.

Here are some ideas for showing another your gratitude for having that special person in your life.

Say the words! Words are powerful and a verbal expression of your appreciation to a person is effective – if you can't do it in person, make the phone call and brighten somebody's day.

Write a letter or note. Spend some time thinking about what you appreciate most about someone and draft a letter by hand, expressing your sentiments. Or maybe a thank you note that is a sincere expression of gratitude.

Show gratitude through creative expression. Homemade gifts mean the most, a little bit of creativity goes a long way. Why not make a scrapbook for your friends, and family members and fill it with photographs or written memories of those special moments over the years?

Give a gratitude gift. Choose a gift aimed specifically at expressing gratitude, and opt for meaningful over monetary value. Gratitude in itself is a gift but giving a thoughtful, personal gift that can be kept, displayed, and treasured is something really special.

Express your appreciation face to face with a gratitude visit. While expressing gratitude in person might be a big step, the gesture of going out of your way to tell someone how much you appreciate them is enough for everyone to feel the benefits. If you can't make the visit in person, send a personalized video message.

Ask how they are (and listen to their response!) The simple act of actively listening to another can be an effective way to show you value them. Put down your phone, remain attentive, and let them steer the conversation.

Several LO members participated in the AAUW Oregon Zoom titled, "LGBTQI+ and Gender Justice and What This Means to Us". The Zoom was presented by Emily Evans, the 2017 Oregon AAUW's Breaking Barriers Award recipient. Emily and her wife live in Portland and have two children. Emily now works as the Senior Trainer for INTERSECT, a gender justice collaborative whose mission is to deepen knowledge, skills, and relationships to advance gender justice leadership in Oregon. Her presentation provided excellent information. One of the key takeaways for me, was her explanation and slides

relating to gender identity, "how you feel about yourself inside", and how that relates to being "trans". (or what being "trans" really means).
