West Linn Robotics Team 7034: 2 Be Determined Saturday, May 11th Oswego Heritage House 398 10th Street, Lake Oswego 9:30 am - Social Time, 9:50 am - Program



In the 2019 November program, seven female members of the West Linn High School Robotics Team **2B Determined** spoke to us about their experiences in creating their project and the following successful efforts in the Girls' Generation competition.

Four years later we see a number of positive changes. Of those who presented, two of the young

women are attending Cal-Poly in Engineering programs and a third is in the Engineering program at OSU.

In their sixth year now, **FRC 7034: 2B Determined** Team has 50 members, with 30% of them female participants, and 70% of the leadership team being female, as well. In addition to creating their robotic project and attending competitions, they sponsor STEM robotics day camps for girls in both elementary and junior high school during the school year, and host a weeklong summer camp for incoming 8th and 9th graders.

They are members of the nationwide **FIRST Robotics Competition** (FRC), which advocates *For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology*. They aim to spread the principles of **FIRST** across the communities, increasing STEM accessibility for those of all ages and all backgrounds. Team 7034 is supported through West Linn Robotics Organization, a 501 (c)(3).

In the Pacific Northwest District, **FRC Team 7034 2B Determined** finished the season ranked 39th out of the 129 teams. They placed 4th at their first competition at Clackamas Academy of Industrial Sciences. They were also awarded the Judges' Award for their outstanding camp programs about STEM, highlighting Changing the SySTEM, a free all-girl's camp they host. At their second competition at Wilsonville High School, they finished 10th. At the Pacific Northwest District Championship they placed 42nd, wrapping up their season.

The team Outreach Lead, Emma Huberty said that all of the members have learned so much more than just engineering principles. Post-COVID, they are re-learning the social skills needed for personal interactions as well as how to take risks, think creatively, collaborate with one another and develop leadership skills.

Live theater, of which I was a passionate follower, as I had known it in the UK was non-existent.

But Andy Warhol's Soup Can images had exhibited in LA earlier that year and a girl I met at a church group told me about a Monday evening art walk on La Cienega, the very street where Warhol had his gallery. I was set to become an Art Groupie! And the opportunity was there to meet artists and become involved in a burgeoning scene. I was briefly married, and we both had an interest in ceramics and that's when that part of my collection began. But the purchase of a plexiglass sculpture was a major reason for our divorce!

I met many people through extension classes at UCLA featuring California and local art and artists, the LA gallery scene, and regular Saturday visit to the galleries. I was even featured in the LA times by the local art critic because of my dedication to 'art looking' each weekend.

I was clearly on my way to becoming a collector. I had no filters, no prejudices and was completely open to the visual.

Transgender Day of Visibility:

Sunday, March 31st, was Transgender Day of Visibility. This day recognizes the lives of transgender people, and the fact that due to discrimination, trans people may not feel safe, or choose to be visible. As you may know, the YWCA of Greater Portland is actively promoting gender and sexual orientation and inclusivity. They state that Oregon is the leader of equality rights and protections for 2SLGBTQIA+ people. (2SLGBTQIA+ stands for Two-Spirit, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer or Questioning and additional sexual orientations and gender identities).

Oregon law:

- Requires health insurance coverage for gender-affirming care.
- Protects health care providers that provide this care.
- Requires school curriculums to be gender inclusive.
- Protects 2SLGBTQIA+ staff and students from bullying on the basis of gender identity or sexual orientation.
- Does not allow discrimination of 2SLGBTIA+ students at school on the basis of gender identity or sexual orientation.

However, there is much more work ahead.

For starters, the YWCA is encouraging us to use correct pronouns as a way to demonstrate that you support our transgender community members.

Harmful	VS.	Respectful Language
A Transgender or Transgendered	Change to	Transgender person/people
Transsexual	Change to	Transgender
MTF (male to female)	Change to	Trans woman
FTM (female to male)	Change to	Trans man

Hopefully, many of you have taken the opportunity to read Honor, by Thrity Umrigar, and attended our April meeting discussion. This novel is based on New York Times news articles describing the oppression and bigotry of women in rural India. It presents a picture of the cultural divide in India between the technological world in the modern cities and the old world cultural and religious beliefs in the rural area, where Hindu men treat women's transgressions, in a barbaric manner which they justify on moral grounds. I found Honor to be a provocative, "eye-opening" read with many topics for discussion. I encourage you to read it on your own or as a book group selection.
