
As the weather cools, September is upon us! Truly the BEST month to live in Oregon in our book ... especially since we celebrate our September birthdays!!

These connections can provide emotional support and reduce feelings of loneliness and isolation for both older and younger individuals. Conversations and storytelling help preserve traditions and family histories, ensuring that valuable stories and practices are passed down. Interacting with people of different ages fosters mutual respect and understanding, breaking down stereotypes. Communities grow stronger with support from everyone interacting in various ways. Our empathy towards others grow as we learn from each other. The more you know someone, the more ways you might discover to connect with them.
