John Goodwin is a community builder, art collector, and cultural innovator who has been the Director of Community Philanthropy at the Portland Art Museum since 2018.

Prior to this appointment, John was the Director of Premium Services for the Portland Trail Blazers. During his tenure there, he served on the Boards of the Art Museum and the Oregon Cultural Trust. A previous job was Director of Membership and Marketing at the University Club of Portland, so to say John is a people person is quite an understatement!

He earned a Bachelor's degree in Journalism/Speech at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and received certificates for studies in History and Economics from the University of London.

The Portland Art Museum project is expected to play a key role in the rebirth of downtown with the transformation of its campus. As the only major art museum between Seattle and San Francisco, it has always been a civic cornerstone and an important educational resource for visitors, and it has existed for more than 130 years..

By the close of 2025, Goodwin speculates "that everyone, whatever their walk of life their raceor religion will also feel *(as he does)* that the Portland Art Museum is a beacon of hope."

After the Peace Corps, she moved to Portland, married, and had two sons. At this point she took a career break to focus on family. Ten years later, she enrolled at Portland Community College to complete the prerequisites for an Occupational Therapy program. She enjoyed participating in prerequisite "hands-on" art activities including a watercolors class, dance (cha-cha, polka ect.) class, and learning to use a pottery wheel in ceramics class.

She then attended Pacific University in Forest Grove, and received a degree in Occupational Therapy. Most of her career as an Occupational Therapist was spent working with preschoolers with a variety of disabling conditions, in educational settings such as Head Start classrooms and private preschools. When Covid occured, she worked for a year and a half providing OT consultation services to families of preschoolers virtually.

Patti enjoys spending time with family and traveling. She has explored icebergs in a zodiac, and traced her "roots" in Ireland. She loves reading and belongs to the Tuesday book group. She is currently the membership co-chair for the LO Branch. She also belongs to a Mahjongg group and recently began knitting prayer shawls.

I am writing to thank you very much for awarding me this scholarship. I am truly honored and deeply grateful for your generous support. This scholarship is a significant milestone in my academic journey and personal development. It will alleviate the financial burden of tuition, books and other educational expenses, allowing me to focus more intently on my studies and extracurricular activities. I am deeply grateful for your confidence in my potential and your commitment to supporting my educational journey.

My major before was early childhood education but now I have changed to Medical Assistant and am pursing my degree at Portland Community College. I was born in Mae Surin, a small village in Thailand refugee camps. Growing up in a refugee camp was challenging me since I did not receive a good education, and the education system was poor. Furthermore, because English is not our first language, teachers in schools do not teach students much about reading and writing in English. I struggled with my English when I first came to the United States. Moving to a new country was a significant challenge for me. I never imagined I'd move to the United States and start a new life. When I first arrived in the United States, I began learning to read and write. I was only 12 years old. I started school in middle school. My first day of school here was really strange and tough for me because I didn't know English. I still remember getting into class on the first day. I was quite frightened and had no friends. Sometimes I didn't want to attend to school anymore because I find it hard to understand what the teacher is teaching. I almost gave up on my studies and told my parents I didn't want to attend school anymore since it was too challenging for me. However, my parents constantly encouraged me to work hard and to not give up quickly. My parents did not have the opportunity to attend school when they were young because they were poor and needed to work to support their family. I was the first generation of my family to attend college. My parents immigrated to the United States, and the fact that they do not speak English, they work extremely hard to provide a better life for me and my brother. I always push myself to work hard and be a good student. Sometimes I feel tired and anxious, and don't want to study but I remind myself I have goals for my future. I always motivate myself to keep going. I am deeply thankful to have parents who love and support me throughout my life. They constantly encourage me to put effort toward my goal. My parents want the best for me and I would continue to work hard for my goals.

Receiving this scholarship is a tremendous honor, and I am deeply appreciative of the confidence you have shown in my potential. I am committed to making the most of this opportunity and to working hard to achieve my academic and professional goals. Thank you once again for your generous support.

The International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women is on Monday, November 25th this year.
