

As many of you may recall, for last October's program, we had a panel discussion with three informed speakers: Greg Martin (librarian) from Wilsonville Public Library, April Younglove (librarian) from Lake Oswego Public Library, and Will Peters, the owner of Mollie Bloom Bookstore in Multnomah Village. They shared their perspectives about the alarming growth of book censorship and then engaged the audience in an informative Q and A session.

The topic was so well received and, unfortunately, remains still so urgent that, as program chairs, we had intentions to revisit this issue again this year. To our great delight, Lake Oswego Public Library is already leading the way. They have developed an entire program highlighting the scope of the book-banning trend, followed by identifying and celebrating our abilities to counter this with Freedom to Read Month. The program plan is to generate a thought-provoking discussion about one of the most banned books in the US, *All Boys Aren't Blue*, by George M. Johnson. Before we dive into the book, LOPL librarians will provide a brief overview of the current book-banning landscape, including recent efforts to target books with minority characters and authors, book challenges locally, and information about how you can support intellectual freedom.

Please join us as LOAAUW and the Heritage House host The LO Public Library's discussion of *All Boys Aren't Blue*. Don't miss this opportunity to explore a controversial book and learn how to protect our right to read.

Note that there are currently free copies of *All Boys Aren't Blue* for those who wish to attend the discussion. They are available for pick-up at the library.

Students pursuing degrees in Early Childhood Education, who apply for our scholarship, will get to know about AAUW.

As an organization, it is important for the community to get to know us. Who we are, what we stand for, and where we want to invest our energy and put our mark. Are there other

community efforts that could benefit from our involvement? We invite you to share your ideas. Let's make this year a focus on community and the issues facing that place where we live.

Membership Profile



Diana was an army brat so grew up in Germany, Greece, and Turkey as well as in El Paso, Texas, where she earned her B.S. in Mathematics at the University of Texas, El Paso. After completing her degree she married and moved to Montana for 12 years, and earned her Masters degree, again in Mathematics, at the University of Montana. Eventually she and her husband moved to Beaverton, where they have lived for 35 years and both have worked in the Portland Public School (PPS) system (namely Franklin High School and (also, for Diana only) Wilson High School (now Ida B. Wells HS). In these schools, Diana pioneered the use of System Dynamics

(SD) modeling of dynamic feedback systems in her mathematics classes and in a yearlong SD modeling course, both for 20 years. For this work she received the Presidential Award for Excellence in Teaching Mathematics, first place in Intel's Innovation in Teaching Award, and was awarded two National Science Foundation grants (firsts for PPS) where she was the director and principal investigator. She has published five books, the last two in SD (which are still in print). After retiring from high school teaching, she returned to school and earned a Ph.D. in System Science from Portland State University and now is the VP of Precollege Education for the System Dynamics Society focused on bringing Systems Thinking lessons and SD modeling lessons to precollege education (from preK-12). She has presented SD modeling techniques globally for about 30 years, many places in Europe, Turkey, South Africa, New Zealand, Singapore, Hong Kong, Japan, Mexico, and Canada, as well as many places in the US.

Diana has two children and soon-to-be her third grandchild. She believes family is the most important job for any parent and loves to interact with her grandchildren.

Diana joined AAUW (both the Portland and Lake Oswego Branches) about a year ago and is currently co-chair of Membership for the Lake Oswego Branch. She also attends two book groups and the lunch bunch in the Lake Oswego Branch. She is enjoying the very interesting ladies she has met in the AAUW.

want to prevent kids from feeling that way when they reach their teen years and give them confidence that they can reach out to someone because I was there to help them early on.


