INTEREST GROUP SPOTLIGHT ON...4th TUESDAY BOOKS

This book group has been active since at least 1997. The members have changed, except for one or two, but our literary outlook and reading guidelines have not. To suggest a book, the person needs to have read it already. That's it! Our youngest member is just turning 65, and our oldest turned 99 in December. Although we generally choose fiction — anything from Lessons in Chemistry to 2034: A Novel to A Gentleman in Moscow — we've also read non-fiction such as The Last Slave Ship or On Call in the Arctic or Grace and Grit. Our hope is to learn about cultures unlike our own or challenges others have faced, such as in Pachinko or Honor or James.

We meet the 4th Tuesday of each month at the Szechuan Kitchen on Boones Ferry Road in Lake Oswego from 11-1. The book discussion leader for the month gives us background information about the author, sometimes reads reviews of the book, and then guides our conversation about what we read. Whether a person has read the book or not, she is encouraged to attend to enjoy our community and conversation. Who knows? Maybe the discussion will spark her interest in reading or finishing the book!

Do you know what flower is associated with International Women's Day?

The Mimosa Flower! This is a very distinctive tree that stands very tall and spreads its branches wide. This tree can live for over 50 years. The flowers are quite small and abundant, with a bright yellow color. Honestly, they look like a lovely patch of sunshine! This flower is often associated with problem solvers and can be given as gifts to inspire a solution to a complex problem. The flowers are a symbol of caring for others. They symbolize strength and sensibility.

This seems to be a perfect fit for a flower selection for International Women's Day. This year, the theme for International Women's Day (May 8, 2025) is to accelerate action. Overall, we need to speed up the process to gain progress in gender equity. Oregon Lobby Days 2025 Are Just Days Away

If you haven't registered yet, now is the time....

Get ready to advance legislation that makes a difference! The AAUW Oregon 2025 Lobby Days event will be held over the week of March 17-21 with inperson and virtual meetings over Zoom. We encourage all AAUW Oregon members to participate in this opportunity for advocacy that is essential to achieve our legislative priorities!

The Public Policy Legislative Reporter Committee evaluated new bills introduced in the state legislature which are aligned with two specific areas chosen by Oregon AAUW members: **Education and Healthcare**. We are also following the progress of HB 3187 Anti-Age Discrimination Bill on which we collected petitions earlier and sent testimonies in favor of the bill. Training materials on the selected bills will be posted on the state website prior to the mandatory training session on Thursday, March 13th at 7 pm.

If you are interested in participating, please complete **BOTH** Step One and Step Two by **March 3rd**.

Step One: Complete the Lobby Days Event registration form. Register for Lobby Days <u>HERE</u>.

Step Two: Register for the mandatory training, which will be held on Thursday, March 13th, 7-8 pm Pacific. Register for the training session <u>HERE</u>.

Step Three: Participate in Lobby Days between March 17 – 21, 2025

After you register:

You will be assembled into teams of AAUW branch members and matched with your Senate and House districts. For in-person meetings, each team will be scheduled to meet with at least two legislative offices while for Zoom meetings, each team will be scheduled to meet with one or two legislative offices. We can help you set up the meetings with legislators, if desired. Regardless of whether you are in-person or online, each meeting will last for 15 to 30 minutes.

Because legislators have many commitments during the busy legislative season, most Lobby Days meetings will be held with legislative staffers and it is not always possible to schedule AAUW members with their own legislators. However, be assured that these meetings are always impactful: because teams will be representing AAUW Oregon as a supporter, legislative offices will consider these meetings to be as important as constituent meetings. We understand that travel incurs a cost, and we appreciate you considering the inperson option. If you can afford to take a road trip, consider carpooling with your fellow members, and if driving a long distance, sharing accommodations to make in-person Lobby Days a more budget friendly event.

Lobby Days is a wonderful opportunity to meet with legislative offices and advance bills to promote gender equity and improve the lives of women and girls.

We hope that you will join us in this important activity to promote our values. The registration information can also be found on the Oregon website by clicking HERE.

Lynn Bliss



Lynn was previously a member of the Lake Oswego Branch but moved to Houston and has recently returned to Lake Oswego to be near family. Born in Long Island, New York, she earned a bachelor's degree in Speech-Language Pathology from the University of Wisconsin. Then, she

received a master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. After working in New York as a speech-language pathologist, she went to the University of Michigan and graduated with a PhD in Linguistics and Speech-Language Pathology. She then taught at Penn State and was the only female faculty member with a PhD. This was followed by a twenty-year career as a professor at Wayne State University. From there, she was recruited to chair the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at the University of Houston.

Upon retirement, Lynn became a docent at the Holocaust Museum of Houston and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston. She also was a guide at the Rothko Chapel, a non-denominational chapel filled with artwork and designed for meditation, whose mission includes promoting social justice. In Portland, she volunteers at the Oregon Jewish Museum and Center for Holocaust Education. She has begun to provide a series of lectures on museums and various aspects of art, including contemporary female Native American artists. Some of these are offered at local adult community centers. Lynn's hobbies include needlepoint, reading and the theatre. She is looking forward to meeting new people and becoming active in AAUW.
