Her focus is on finding the most suitable, stress-free, and efficient way to support relocation. Her team carefully assesses the



needs of the individual and then provides a tailored strategy, ensuring a smooth and safe transition.

Her systems approach involves networking with regional senior services, involving independent and assisted living facilities, clubs, community centers, and medical supports. Her ethos is one of respecting the individual and the environment; as much as possible, all items from downsizing are sold, repurposed, or reused.

Marjorie Synakiewicz is the Volunteer Coordinator for the WLLO Village (West Linn, Lake Oswego, and Stafford). She will share information about the program and its many options as either members or volunteers. Marjorie will explain the history and the mission of the Villages, a focused community effort to help one another 'age in place'.

The national Village Movement began in 1999 with Beacon Hill, in Massachusetts. Since then, there have been more than 250 Villages throughout the US, with another 62 in development.

Portland created a model called the 'Hub and Spoke,' with 10 Villages in the greater metro area and one on the North Coast. The purpose of this concept was to enable communities to share resources and combine efforts to provide useful, quality services to members. Portland is the Hub and takes on more responsibility for providing resources and coordinating volunteer support.

The mission of the Villages is: "To support dynamic, intentionally inclusive, caring communities that connect, engage, and inform our older adults as they maintain active, purposeful lives in the setting that they identify as 'home'".

# **New Member Profile Aase Besson**



Aase grew up in Denmark and moved to Frankfurt, Germany at the age of twenty two. While working there at a military clinic, she met John H. Besson, an American Rear Admiral from Oregon. Eventually they married in Vienna, and spent six months honeymooning around the United States. Then they returned to Frankfurt where they lived for two years before spending a year in Spain. Along the way, she gave birth to two sons.

From Spain, they moved to Lake Oswego, and a few years later she enrolled at Portland State University.

While there, she served as President of the Foreign Language Honor Society, and went on to receive degrees in German and Spanish. Asse enjoyed reading literature in these languages, and learning about their respective cultures.

Aase was on the board of the Oregon Chapter of the American Scandinavian Foundation (now known as Nordic Northwest) for thirty years, including many years as the

Membership Chair. Nordic Northwest is a nonprofit organization that celebrates Nordic culture, traditions, and heritage. She has also been very involved in Plan International, a development and humanitarian organization that works in over eighty countries across Africa, the Americas, and Asia. Their focus is on equality for girls and children's rights including the right to education, healthcare, and a safe environment. The organization has sent her on several fact-finding trips to Central and South America.

Aase enjoys traveling to Denmark twice a year. She also belongs to a Danish book group where they read books by Danish authors and discuss them in Danish. Although Aase no longer plays tennis as she did for fifty years, she continues to enjoy an active lifestyle and staying fit.
